Top Story: Family Planning Waiver Extended to Men in Wisconsin

The Department of Health Services has received federal approval to extend the Family Planning Waiver to Men, beginning May 1, 2010. Information will be provided as available, including a provider update.

Existing Eligibility Guidelines for the Family Planning Waiver:

- Be a U.S. citizen, or have proof of immigration status,
- Be age 15 through 44,
- Not be receiving Elderly, Blind or Disabled Medicaid or BadgerCare Plus Standard or Benchmark Plans,
- Have a family gross income of no more than 200% of the federal poverty level (For minors, parents' income is not counted)
- There is no asset test for this plan

Covered Services: The following services may be covered if provided at an initial or annual office visit:

- Contraceptive services and supplies and natural family planning supplies
- Family planning pharmacy visits
- Pap tests, tubal ligation, or tests and treatment for sexually transmitted diseases as well as certain other lab tests
- Routine preventive primary services only if related to family planning

If you are able enroll in the Family Planning Waiver Plan, you may be able to get regular BadgerCare Plus which pays for more services.

BadgerCare Plus HMO Changes for Southeast Wisconsin

The landscape of BadgerCare Plus for Families is adjusting in Southeast Wisconsin. Families that are enrolled in BadgerCare Plus Standard Plan or Benchmark Plan will need to choose an HMO in the late summer or early fall depending on where they live. Individuals on SSI Medicaid; Elderly, Blind, and Disabled Medicaid; and BadgerCare Plus Core Plan are NOT impacted! The HMOs that serve the SSI Managed Care Population and the BC+ Core Population will remain the same.

WHO: Children and families on BadgerCare Plus in Milwaukee, Racine, Kenosha, Waukesha, Ozaukee, and Washington counties.

WHY: The Department of Health Services intends to contract with four HMOs:

- Abri Health Plan
- Children's Community Health Plan
- Community Connect
- United Healthcare

"The contract awards follow requests by the Department of Health Services this year for bids from the private managed care organizations in southeastern Wisconsin that oversee the state health program for low-income families with children under the age of 19. The new contracts - potentially worth tens of millions of dollars - will hold the companies to stricter standards..." TIMEFRAME: Depending on where a member lives, he or she will choose a new HMO over the course of 3 months. The first phase is mid-July to mid-August (with selections effective September 1, 2010); the second phase is mid-August to mid-September (with selections effective October 1, 2010). Members will get an enrollment package in the mail which will provide information on how they can select their HMO. Anyone applying for BadgerCare Plus in the meantime, beginning in April, will be fee for service until the late summer/early fall when they will then make an HMO selection. If someone does not select an HMO, they will be auto-enrolled. The Department of Health Services will hold trainings for partners and providers in the early summer to provide more details.

NUMBERS: This impacts over 240,000 individuals in the 6-county area. [Frequently Asked Questions](#) are posted online.

Lessons from the BadgerCare Plus Core Plan Re-Certification in Milwaukee:

The re-certification for the BadgerCare Plus Core plan has begun in Milwaukee! The process of renewal is unique to the GAMP population (those on General Assistance Medical Program). GAMP provided general medical services to uninsured individuals residing in Milwaukee County who met specific criteria. GAMP patients were automatically enrolled in the Wisconsin BadgerCare Plus Core Plan in January 2009. Here's what is happening in Milwaukee to date:

The Numbers:

- There are approximately 11,000 individuals enrolled in BC+ Core Plan from the GAMP program (Frequently called "TCLA" or Transitional Childless Adults Population)
- As of Monday, April 12, 2,787 renewal applications were processed--no denials were issued as of that date
- Of those 2,787: 70% paid the \$60 fee (or had the homeless waiver applied)
- Of those 2,787: 40% renewed online using ACCESS.WI.GOV, while 60% renewed over the phone
- 10,563 have received their physicals (a requirement that must be fulfilled in the first year of the Core Plan)
- The 20 "most visited" pharmacies in the greater Milwaukee area are reminding people to renew their Core Plan when they come in to fill prescriptions

Had we done nothing, by 2019 the number of uninsured people would have grown by more than 30 percent in 29 states and by at least 10 percent in every state. The amount of uncompensated care provided would more than double in 45 states. Businesses in 27 states will see their premiums more than double. Fewer people would have coverage through an employer. (1) The new law expands coverage to millions of Americans while reducing premiums and out-of-pocket costs. It provides the security of knowing that if you lose your job, change your job, or start that new business, you'll always be able to purchase quality, affordable care in a new competitive health insurance market that keeps costs down. Under reform in Wisconsin:

The Timing of Renewals: TCLA renewal dates are split into three groups based upon month of member's birth:

- Jan., Feb., Mar., & April: renewal due 3/31/10
- May, June, July, & August: due 4/30/10
- Sept., Oct., Nov., and Dec.: due 5/31/10

Renewal applications must be submitted in the "renewal month" or the following month. Verification and the payment of an annual non-refundable fee of \$60 is required as well (with the only exception being those that meet the HUD definition of homeless). Steps in Renewal (Source: [Ops Memo 10-14 Amended](#))

- Step 1: Start the Renewal Application within the renewal month.
- Step 2: Submit the Renewal Application by the end of the renewal month or the following month
- Step 3: 30 days to pay the \$60 fee
- Step 4: 30 days to provide the required verifications
- NOTE: Even if all the steps are completed "in time," any steps completed after the month following the renewal month will create a gap in eligibility.

Special ACCESS.WI.GOV "Security Code:"

- TCLA re-certification requires a "Security Code"
- The Code is the same for all TCLA members and can ONLY be used by TCLA members.
- The code is 9867546774
- This code is a one-use per person security code.
- NOTE: If you or an individual you are working with has a problem with the code, contact [Sarah Fraley](#) or [Connor Sperry](#) to request that the code be "re-set." This might happen if a person mistakenly closes out of the online renewal.

Family Health Benefits Bill-Status Report!

In preparation for a changing health care landscape, ABC for Health partnered with the Department of Health Services and the Office of The Commissioner of Insurance as well as lead sponsors Senator Miller and Representative Donna Seidel to develop the "Family Health Benefits Bill" (AB 878/ SB 633) to lay the foundation to support a statewide network of Health Benefits Counselors in Wisconsin.

Legislative History:

- Executive Session in the Senate Committee on Health, Health Insurance on March 30 for a vote: ended in a tie.
- Assembly Committee on Health and Healthcare Reform on March 31 for a vote and passed 8-4.
- Passed the Joint Finance Committee with a vote of 12-4
- Moved to the Assembly Rules Committee April 9
- Off to the full Assembly for a vote during the April floor session (approx. April 13-22)

- 541,000 residents who do not currently have insurance and 320,000 residents who have nongroup insurance could get affordable coverage through the health insurance exchange.
- 358,000 residents could qualify for premium tax credits to help them purchase health coverage.
- 871,000 seniors would receive free preventive services.
- 155,000 seniors would have their brand-name drug costs in the Medicare Part D "doughnut hole" halved.
- 77,400 small businesses could be helped by a small business tax credit to make premiums more affordable.

Health Insurance Reform Provides Early Relief and Health Security.

Families: The 5.6 million residents of Wisconsin will benefit as reform:

- Ensures consumer protections in the insurance market. Insurance companies will no longer be able to place lifetime limits on the coverage they provide, use of annual limits will be restricted, and they will not be able to arbitrarily drop coverage.
- Creates immediate options for people who can't get insurance today. 7 percent of people in Wisconsin have diabetes (2), and 26 percent have high blood pressure (3) – two conditions that insurance companies could use as a reason to deny health insurance coverage. Reform will establish a high-risk pool to enable people who cannot get insurance today to find an affordable health plan.
- Ensures free preventive services. 33 percent of Wisconsin residents have not had a colorectal cancer screening, and 21 percent of women over 50 have not had a mammogram in the past two years. (4) Health insurance reform will ensure that people can access preventive services for free through their health plans. It will also invest in a prevention and public health fund to encourage prevention and wellness programs.

Office of Health Care Reform

[Governor Doyle announced](#) April 7 that Wisconsin has created a new agency, the Office of Health Care Reform, to prepare for the sweeping changes from health care reform that take effect over the next four years. The new office will be overseen by Karen Timberlake, the secretary of the Department of Health Services, and Sean Dilweg, Wisconsin's Commissioner of Insurance. Office of Health Care Reform Tasks:

- Provide transparent access to information;
- Assess insurance market reforms needed to prepare Wisconsin for final implementation of national health reform in 2014
- Develop a plan to pursue federal funds for a temporary high risk health insurance pool

The OHR will create a health insurance purchasing exchange that will:

- Create a website where small business owners and individuals can find comparisons of insurance policies
- Provide a single point of access for all eligible residents and businesses to choose their insurance
- Promote easy comparability of health plans and lower health care premium costs by creating a large pool of employees
- Structure to reward highest quality and most cost-effective health care providers and insurers

Dunn County HealthWatch Coalition:

The Coalition is hosting a special luncheon meeting on Wednesday, April 28,

early retirees. An estimated 71,600 people from Wisconsin have early retiree coverage through their former employers, but early retiree coverage has eroded over time. (5) A reinsurance program would stabilize early retiree coverage and provide premium relief to both early retirees and the workers in the firms that provide their health benefits. This could save families up to \$1,200 on premiums.

Seniors: Wisconsin's 871,000 Medicare beneficiaries (6) will benefit as reform:

- Lowers premiums by reducing Medicare's overpayments to private plans. All Medicare beneficiaries pay the price of excessive overpayments through higher premiums – even the 74 percent of seniors in Wisconsin who are not enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan. (7) A typical couple in traditional Medicare will pay nearly \$90 in additional Medicare premiums next year to subsidize these private plans. (8) Health insurance reform clamps down on these excessive payments.
- Reduces prescription drug spending. Roughly 155,000 Medicare beneficiaries in Wisconsin hit the “doughnut hole,” or gap in Medicare Part D drug coverage that can cost some seniors an average of \$4,080 per year. (9) Reform legislation will provide a 50 percent discount for brand-name drugs in this coverage gap.
- Covers free preventive services. Currently, seniors in Medicare must pay part of the cost of many preventive services on their own. For a colonoscopy that costs \$692, this means that a senior must pay \$162 (10) – a price that can be prohibitively expensive. Under reform, a senior will not pay anything for that colonoscopy, or for any other recommended preventive service. A senior will also get free annual wellness visits to his or her provider, with a personalized prevention plan to remain in

BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan: Tracking through the Legislature

The BadgerCare Plus Basic Bill, [SB 484](#), was on the Wisconsin Senate Floor for exciting debate a few weeks ago passing with a [vote of 17-16](#). The Bill went to the Assembly Committee on Health and Healthcare Reform on March 31 for a vote and passed 8-4. The Bill was sent to the Assembly Rules Committee on April 2. The Bill will move to the full Assembly for a vote during the April floor session.

The Recent Buzz on Basic:

Line Item Veto: Rep. Fitzgerald, Republican leader of the Assembly, requested a memo from the Legislative Fiscal Bureau asking if the Governor, by line-item veto, could turn BC+ Basic into a “statewide public option.”

Possible: The [Legislative Fiscal Bureau memo](#) explained that it is within Wisconsin's constitution for the Governor to line-item veto, i.e., by expanding beyond the original proposition to make the plan available to income eligible, childless adults, currently on the Core Plan waiting list.

Not Probable: The Governor's office assured constituents it has no intention of using line-item veto to amend the original proposition.

Updates from DHS

Operations Memos

Below, find Wisconsin's Department of Health Services (DHS) Operation Memos (Ops Memos) or information updates, with brief summaries and/or rationales drawn from the information provided by DHS. Ops Memo 10-33: Implementing Policy and Automation for SSI Transition Plans and Updating Policy and Automation for W-2 Supportive Service Plans (released April 12)

New Policy: This Memo provides W-2 agencies with new policy and automation instructions for developing SSI and SSDI Transition Plans for W-2 Participants, as well as updated policy and automation instructions for developing W-2 Supportive Service Plans for applicants that withdraw their W-2 applications prior to W-2 placement and participants who are placed in case management placement.

Ops Memo 10-32: Wisconsin Shares Child Care Subsidy (released April 9)

New Policy: This Memo informs the county/tribal subsidy administrative agencies about changes in the attendance reporting process, forms, and the CCPI System. The new attendance reporting module has three modes: weekly, daily, and in/out. The Memo explains how these new modes work and what changes have been made to the forms that use these modes, as well as the CCPI System.

Ops Memo 10-26: Caretaker Supplement Certification Periods (Released April 7)

New Policy: This Memo announces a shift in policy regarding Caretaker Supplement (CTS) certification periods. CTS certification periods have been extended from 6 to 12 months and no longer require new applications when a CTS case moves from one agency to another.

CASE TIP: Health Care Decisions

April 16 has been designated "National HealthCare Decisions Day" by the governor and other state and national leaders. As you talk to families about appropriate care and coverage options, take some time this week to consider your own future medical care wishes. This can be as simple as discussing your wishes with family, friends, or healthcare providers.

In Wisconsin, competent adults have the right to control decisions about their future medical care, including the right to accept or refuse treatment and the right to be an organ and tissue donor. In spite of this legal right, it is estimated that 80% of residents have NOT documented their preferences through advance directives.

Two of the basic advance directive documents are a living will and durable power of attorney for health care. These are legal documents that allow individuals to give critical medical information and directions to their healthcare providers, healthcare agent, and family/friends about their wishes. 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
