Federal High Risk Pool Accepts Applications TODAY!

Wisconsin is expected to begin taking applications for the Federal Health Insurance Risk Sharing Plan (Federal HIRSP) on July 15, 2010 for an August 1 effective date. Administered through the existing Wisconsin HIRSP authority, the Federal HIRSP plan will have different eligibility and application requirements from what we know as the existing State HIRSP plan. To qualify for the Federal Pool, a person must:

- 1. Be a citizen or national of the United States, or be lawfully present; and
- 2. Have a preexisting medical condition; and
- 3. Been uninsured for at least 6 months before applying for the HIRSP Federal Plan.

Keep your eye on the <u>HIRSP website</u> for new details as they become available. Be sure to visit the <u>Frequently Asked Questions Tab</u> for the interaction of BadgerCare Plus Core Plan and Basic Plans with Federal HIRSP.

Why Attend?

Currently, only an estimated 66% of eligible households participate in FoodShare Wisconsin (formerly known as food stamps), ranking below the national average. FoodShare not only puts healthy, nutritious food on the table for our low-income families, children, and seniors: the USDA estimates that every \$5 spent with FoodShare benefits generates \$9.20 in local economic activity, additional resources that no Wisconsin community can afford to turn away.

On September 17, join the network of public and private community partners throughout the state who are committed to increasing FoodShare enrollment by integrating outreach activities into their daily business without taking on extra projects. Many of us interact with potentially eligible families and individuals every day - we can make them aware of FoodShare, help them access benefits, and break the stigma long associated with "getting food stamps!"

New Policy: Effective May 1, 2010, new assessment tools and two new medical forms will be put into effect. In addition, several policy suggestions will be under consideration.

Operations Memo 10-55: Southeast Wisconsin HMO Enrollment Project (Released July 9)

New Policy: Effective July 17, 2010, individuals in six Wisconsin counties (Milwaukee, Racine, Kenosha, Waukesha, Washington and Ozaukee) on the BadgerCare Plus plan will have to choose one of four HMOs to provide them with continued medical and dental coverage. If an individual does not choose a provider after 90 days, they

coverage for children. Coalitions are strongly encouraged to include local health departments as the key stakeholder. Your County can create a coalition to develop a sustainable plan to connect and maintain family connections to health coverage, care, and resources.

Getting Started:

Start by identifying community partners and leaders, including representatives from hospital systems, Head Start, parents, Birth-to-3 Coordinators, public health nurses, economic support workers, school nurses and counselors, advocates, employers, and members of the faith community. Then, watch for an RFP! The Wisconsin Department of Health Services and HealthWatch Wisconsin will issue a call for proposals to invite coalitions to compete for funding. We will prioritize coalition development for low-enrollment, under-performing or health disparity locations across Wisconsin. In fact, HealthWatch Wisconsin will prioritize coalition development where local health departments take a leading role. After funding, HealthWatch Wisconsin will continue to help with ongoing technical consultation and leadership training. We will be looking for areas that can DEVELOP and SUSTAIN a coalition, after the start-up assistance is complete.

HHS Calls for Public Comment on Proposed HIPAA Changes

HHS to Improve Patient Privacy

The US Department of Health & Human Services (HHS) has considered restricting the disclosure or sale of health information and expanding an individual's rights to access information. To do this, HHS is required to issue a "notice of proposed rulemaking" to modify the HIPAA Privacy, Security, and Enforcement Rules.

Operations Memo 10-52: Child Care Provider Certification (CCPC) System Changes - New Caregiver Law (Released July 9)

New Policy: Effective July 12, 2010, three changes went into action. 'Date of check field' can be modified so the next check date defaults to three or twelve months (1); when the CPS check date is entered, the system leaves the 'date of next check' date empty because none are required (2) and there is a mandatory field to be completed after a background check, if there is a record, mark 'yes' and enter a comment (3).

Operations Memo 10-53: Core Plan Waitlist Bypass for Basic Members Diagnosed with Cancer (Released July 9)

New Policy: Effective July 1, 2010, individuals on BadgerCare Basic, diagnosed with cancer, not including non-melanoma skin cancers, can bypass the waitlist for BadgerCare Core Plan. The individuals must be on the Basic plan in order to skip the waitlist. If they are approved to bypass, their application can begin processing immediately.

Operations Memo 10-54:

Preprinted Mail-In Renewal Forms: CWW Updates (Released July 8) New Policy: Effective July 19, 2010, CARES Workers Web will allow employees to automatically mail or print the Case Summary, Renewal Summary Page and Renewal Signature Page.

Operations Memo 10-39: Birth Certificates for Puerto Rican Individuals (Amended) (Released July 7)

New Policy: Effective October 1, 2010, Puerto Rican Birth Certificates filed on or before October 1, 2010 are no longer considered valid. This is a change to the original invalidation date of on or before July 1, 2010. The new three month window gives Puerto Rican citizens time to apply for and receive their new birth certificate, while their previous one is still valid.


Operations Memo 10-51:

FoodShare Eligibility for EBD Households (Released July 1)
New Policy: *Income*: Effective immediately, households that include an elderly or disabled member with gross household income over 200% of the FPL

The Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health (HITECH) Act, enacted as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, is designed to promote the widespread adoption and standardization of health information technology. In order for the new law to be enacted to its fullest, HHS will have to modify the HIPAA Privacy, Security, and Enforcement Rules to strengthen the privacy and security protections for health information. In so doing, it is predicted that the workability and effectiveness of the HIPAA rules will be improved.

The proposed modifications to the HIPAA Rules include:

- Provisions extending the applicability of certain of the Privacy and Security Rules' requirements to the business associates of covered entities,
- Establishing new limitations on the use and disclosure of protected health information for marketing and fundraising purposes,
- Prohibiting the sale of protected health information,



 Provisions designed to strengthen and expand HIPAA's enforcement provisions.

The public is <u>invited to comment</u> on the provisions of the proposed rule for 60 days following publication in the Federal Register.

BadgerCare Plus Basic and Core Plans: Status Report

BadgerCare Plus Basic and Core Plans: Status Report

BadgerCare Plus Basic, the new program for individuals on the Core Plan waiting list, began enrolling members in BadgerCare Plus Basic on June 1 with benefits beginning in July. Rich Albertoni, Director, Bureau of Enrollment Management at DHS provided the Update with the following status report on Basic enrollment:

- As of June 15, 2010, the total number of individuals enrolled and eligible for benefits to begin in July was 1,681
- As of July 8, 2010 (at 5 p.m.) total enrollment had increased to 2,146

If you assisted individuals with their Core Plan applications or know someone who had applied for Core Plan after October 9, 2009, be sure to let them know the steps needed to get OFF the Core Plan waiting list and ON to the Basic Plan! Individuals should have already received a mailing that included a fact sheet and instructions on how to enroll. Similar to Core Plan enrollment, individuals should call 1-800-291-2002 or visit www.access.wisconsin.gov to apply. Remember, enrollment in the Basic Plan always starts on the 1st of the month. Which month coverage starts depends on when the applicant pays her first \$130 monthly premium:

- If your first premium is received before 4:30 p.m. on the 15th of the month, your enrollment will start on the first of the next month.
- If your first premium is received after 4:30 p.m. on the 15th of the month, enrollment will be delayed a month

must be tested for FoodShare using the regular SNAP rules. Under the regular SNAP rules, these households have no gross income limit, but must have net income that does not exceed 100% FPL. *Assets*: Households tested under the regular SNAP rules must have countable assets at or below \$3000. The FoodShare Handbook Chapter 4.4 has been updated with the current policy regarding when to count or exempt assets.

Provider Updates

Durable Medical Equipment Place of Service Codes for Members Residing in a Facility for Developmental Disabilities Facilities for developmental disabilities

Facilities for developmental disabilities (FDD), are reimbursed through their daily rate for durable medical equipment (DME) reasonably associated with the care of residents, such as manual wheelchairs. Reimbursement for some specialized DME items, such as powered mobility equipment and custom wheelchair positioning systems, is not included in the daily rate. These items may be separately reimbursable when medically necessary and when prior authorized by ForwardHealth.

July 2010 Preferred Drug List Review and Other Pharmacy Policy Changes

This ForwardHealth Update provides an overview of the changes to Preferred Drug List (PDL) drug classes. Providers may refer to the following resources on the Pharmacy page of the ForwardHealth Portal for the complete list of preferred and non-preferred drugs for drugs covered by the benefit plan: The Wisconsin Medicaid, BadgerCare Plus Standard, and SeniorCare Preferred Drug List-Quick Reference; The BadgerCare Plus Core Plan Brand Name Drugs-Quick Reference.
Effective July 1, 2010, any BadgerCare Basic member, that is diagnosed by a

Basic member, that is diagnosed by a physician as having any cancer besides non-melanoma skin cancers, can bypass the Core Plan waitlist and apply. The individual must be currently enrolled in Basic before approval to bypass the waitlist.

Individuals who registered for BadgerCare Plus Core Plan in June of last year must be ready to renew their benefits!

- Current enrollees will get a letter in the mail that will indicate "it is time to renew" Core Plan benefits.
- Renewal applications must be submitted in the "renewal month" or the following month
- If not submitted in time, the individual will have to apply for the waiting list.
- Step 1: Start the Renewal Application within the first 5 days of the renewal month.
- Step 2: Submit the Renewal Application by the end of the renewal month or the following month
- Step 3: 30 days to pay the \$60 fee
- Step 4: 30 days to provide the required verifications
- NOTE: Even if all the steps are completed "in time," any steps completed after the month following the renewal month will create a gap in eligibility.

Share These Tips for Individuals with Core Plan Renewals:

- Members should get their physical before the end of their renewal month
- · Make sure address is current
- Change address either by calling the Enrollment Service Center (ESC) or by filling out a report in your "MyACCESS" account
- Check the due date of renewal on the MyACCESS account page
- Renewal notices should have been mailed 45 days before its due date
- If you have any questions about the renewal process, please start with looking at the renewal chapter in the ACCESS Handbook.

Tucked into the BadgerCare Plus Handbook, Chapter 7 is a step-by-step guide to determine whether an individual meets all the "BC+ insurance access/coverage requirements." The guide is written in "interview form" and asks the applicant a series of 19 questions.

The interview is followed by a series of 11 questions for individuals likely eligible for BadgerCare Plus Prenatal program as well! Visit the <u>BadgerCare Plus Eligibility Handbook, Chapter 7.8</u> for this useful resource.
