Marysa's Section: Online Renewals are Here!

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services has issued "Operations Memo 10-05," titled, "Online Renewals and Six Month Reports in ACCESS." If you recall, in our November 15, 2009 Update newsletter, we previewed some of the changes scheduled to come down the pike in 2010 for state benefits programs. We are very hopeful that "online renewal" of benefits will make an impact on families. From our experience working with families enrolled in BadgerCare Plus and other state programs, many needlessly fall out of eligibility simply because they failed to timely renew their benefits with their case worker, even when they still meet every other eligibility requirement. It is our hope that online renewal of benefits enhances retention in programs! In this section, find a few highlights as drafted in the DHS Ops Memo:

- A "Renew My Benefits" (RMB) tool will be added to ACCESS.
- RMB is accessed through the member's "MyACCESS" page. (Approx. 45 days before a program period is scheduled to end, ACCESS account users will receive a message on their MyACCESS page saying it's time to renew.)
- RMB is effective January 25, 2010
- RMB will allow members to complete FoodShare, health care, and Child Care renewals online and to submit FoodShare and Child Care Six Month Reports forms online
- The ACCESS Handbook will be updated.

The Ops Memo is complete with "screen shots" of the CARES/CWW system and flow of online actions into worker inboxes. This is instrumental in helping to picture how the process will work. Overall, the online renewal hinges on individuals and families being actively connected to a "MyACCESS" page. This will be easier for some, and very challenging for others who are not actively online. Working with Private Insurance Rule Changes

Re-Visiting the New Coverage of Young Adults Rule in Wisconsin

In June 2009, Wisconsin passed a new law requiring health insurance policies to cover eligible young adults up to age 27. The law, effective as of January 1, 2010, applies to individual health and group health benefit plans and a self-insured plan of the state, or a county, city, village, town or school district, including limited scope plans, such as vision and dental plans. However, the law does not apply to non-state regulated, selffunded coverage plans, which officials say make up roughly 40 percent of the state's insurance. To be eligible for this coverage young adults must be:

- Over 17 but less than 27 years of age,
- Not married, and
- Either not eligible for health coverage through the young adult's employer or whose premium contribution for employer coverage is greater than the additional premium amount the parent is required to pay to add the young adult to the parent's health plan.

Tax Consequences?

Parents who seek to add children up to age 27, who do not qualify as tax dependents under the IRS code, to their health insurance plans will likely have to consider the tax consequences. There are a few resources that can help understand the impact of this rule change:

Commissioner of Insurance's Emergency Rule Expands the New COBRA Extension

The federal law that offered a subsidy for individuals electing COBRA coverage, the <u>American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009</u> (ARRA), originally related to the many workers who were involuntarily terminated on or after September 1, 2008, through December, 31, 2009.

On January 11, 2010, Wisconsin Insurance Commissioner Sean Dilweg announced an employees of Wisconsin small employers to take advantage of the extension of a popular federal health insurance premium subsidy. Read the Commissioner's press release. The rule extends the ARRA amendments to health benefit plans that are not covered under federal law, generally employers with fewer than 20 employees.

Recently, in the <u>Department of Defense Appropriations Act for Fiscal Year 2010</u>, the subsidy program was extended. The extension increased the duration of the COBRA subsidy from 9 months to 15 months for eligible employees and their dependents and extends eligibility for the subsidy to those who lose their jobs on or before February 28, 2010.

Case Tip: Prior Authorization Help for PT, OT, and Speech

Coordinating with your child's therapists is a necessary first step in avoiding PA problems. A complete yet specific prior authorization request will provide the following information:

Goals and Outcomes: In drafting a prior authorization request, it is helpful to spell out all the activities the child will perform, as well as the goal of each activity, the desired outcome from that activity, and a statement of what that outcome will accomplish. Many activities will help a child succeed in the home setting or in a school/educational setting. Therefore, a speech therapist at school may indicate in the PA request that the ability to use a voice-assisted device would help the child communicate with her teachers to ask or answer questions, to facilitate learning. A private therapist would indicate in the PA request that the ability to use a voice-assisted device would help the child communicate pain or medical concerns, to facilitate safety at home and in the community.

Medical Necessity: For some children, a prior authorization request is for services necessary to protect the child or keep her out of the hospital. A child at risk of harm or in need of constant monitoring should include a doctor's letter in with the PA

request to document the medical reasons for the necessary service. The doctor should include in this letter a diagnosis, explanation of the desired service, and specific examples of what would happen to the child without that service. Listing examples of problems or incidents that have occurred in the past or an estimate of the harm that could happen in the future will add context to the request.

Parental Observations: Parents or caretakers, who spend more time with their child than the doctor or therapist, may be in the best position to offer their observations and concerns about their child's therapy needs. Parents may consider keeping a diary or journal to share with the therapist or to submit in addition to the Prior Authorization request. This diary may document areas where the child has regressed or excelled, problems the child has encountered, and the fears or concerns of the family. Recording these issues on a daily basis will show patterns of behavior or need and make it easier later to recall specific examples.

Ops Memo 10-01: Wisconsin Works (W-2) and Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR) Collaboration (Released January 6, 2010)

New Policy: A 2008 Work Group has identified a Technical Assistance Guide (TAG) that offers W-2 and DVR case managers strategies for better communication and coordination between the two programs. A training will be offered on these strategies. More information on the training is available here. Rationale: A 2008 Memorandum of Understanding was developed to better serve the needs of disabled individuals who may benefit from both W-2 and DVR programs. The action outlined here reflects the latest steps in keeping with the goals of that MOU.
