My Coverage Plan Secures NIH Grant!

New Health Coverage Plan Technology Approved

My Coverage Plan, Inc. Secures a Major NIH Research Grant to Reduce Health Disparities in Wisconsin

Madison, WI - My Coverage Plan, Inc., a Madison-based for profit subsidiary of ABC for Health Inc., received a major new grant for up to four years and \$1.2 million from the National Institutes of Health's Small Business



Innovation Research (SBIR) Program to support and accelerate the development of new health coverage information technology (pat. pend.). "Our new My Coverage Plan technology is groundbreaking," says Bobby Peterson, public interest attorney, founder of ABC for Health, Inc., and President of My Coverage Plan, Inc. "The new company will create a web-based software solution to the vexing problem of correctly identifying and maximizing myriad public and private health care coverage options for both health consumers and providers. Our partnership with ABC for Health correctly identifying health care coverage strategies for patients." ABC for Health is a leading Wisconsin public interest law firm that has helped families navigate the maze and bureaucracy of health care financing and coverage programs for over 16 years.

Despite the passage of Health Reform, our systems continue with a complex interplay of public and private health care coverage options. Proactive benefits coordination is just one of the proven strategies to reduce avoidable health disparities related to a lack of coverage or adequate insurance. In the process, Peterson says My Coverage Plan technology will promote increased access to healthcare while reducing levels of uncompensated care for health care providers.

Operations Memos

Below, find Wisconsin's Department of Health Services (DHS) Operations Memos (Ops Memos) or information updates, with brief summaries and/or rationales drawn from the information provided by DHS. Any "Opinions" highlighted below are interpretations of HealthWatch Wisconsin staff and Update editors. Follow the links to view the actual memos:

Operations Memo 10-46:

Renegotiating the Terms of Job Access Loan (JAL) Repayment (Released June 14)

New Policy: The memo informs Wisconsin Works (W-2) agencies that there is a process that allows them to add in-kind payments to a loan that was originally structured to be repaid in cash only. The repayment terms of a JAL may be renegotiated up to the third late or missed payment. When a JAL is renegotiated before the 15th of the month, the next payment and in-kind hours are due on the 25th of that month. If the renegotiation is done after the 15th of the month, the next payment and in-kind hours are due on the 25th of the next month.

Operations Memo 10-39: Birth Certificates for Puerto Rican Individuals (Released May 26)

New Policy: Ops Memo 10-39 is meant to inform local agencies of a change

HIRSP and the Federal High Risk Pool

At the June 7 meeting, the Dane County HealthWatch Coalition welcomed Josh Weisbrod from HIRSP (Wisconsin's Health Insurance Risk Sharing Plan) to provide updates on the status of HIRSP in an era of health reform. As the new Federal High Risk Pool conversation is advancing, one thing is becoming clearer: it's as complicated as you thought. Josh led a discussion that helped shed some light on a few issues.

HIRSP will be administering the Federal High Risk Pool for the state of Wisconsin and is hoping to begin enrolling people as early as July 1, for coverage beginning August 1. Here are the eligibility requirements for the Federal High Risk Pool:

- Applicant must be U.S. Citizen or lawfully present in the United States (a Federal rule)
- Applicant must have a pre-existing medical condition
- Applicants must be uninsured for 6 months to be eligible for the Federal pool any form of insurance will bar them from the program; Please note: People **can** be eligible for the BadgerCare Plus Core Plan, Basic Plan, or Benchmark Plan, but they **cannot** have enrolled.

The Federal High Risk Pool will have a premium based on standard market rates for individual health insurance. The premium rates for the Federal Pool are expected to be lower than the full HIRSP premium rates. HIRSP will not be allowed to offer a low-income subsidy for the Federal Pool.

BadgerCare Plus Basic Enrollment: Reactions After the First Two Weeks!

How To Enroll

To enroll in the Basic Plan, you must be on the Core Plan Waiting List. It's not too late to join the growing waiting list! To do so, either "Apply for <u>Benefits</u>" online or call the Enrollment Services Center at 1-800-291-2002. You will get a letter to confirm you have been placed on the list.

that could affect people born in Puerto Rico who apply for Medicaid programs, BadgerCare Plus, or FoodShare on or after July 1, 2010. A new law enacted by the government of Puerto Rico will invalidate all certified copies of birth certificates issued by the Puerto Rico Health Department before July 1, 2010. Thus, these birth certificates will no longer be acceptable as verification of US citizenship (for Medicaid or BC+) or identifications filed on or after July 1, 2010.

Provider Updates

Coverage of Cervarix® and Changes to the Coverage of Gardasil®

Effective for dates of service (DOS) on and after December 1, 2009, Cervarix® is a covered service for female members ages 19-26 years of age. Effective for DOS on and after May 1, 2010, Cervarix[®] will be available through the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program and will be covered for Wisconsin Medicaid and BadgerCare Plus female members ages 9-18 years of age. Cervarix® is covered by Wisconsin Medicaid, the BadgerCare Plus Standard Plan, the BadgerCare Plus Benchmark Plan, and the BadgerCare Plus Core Plan. Effective for DOS on and after December 1, 2009, Gardasil® will be covered for both male and female members. Gardasil remains age restricted for members ages 9-26 years of age. Gardasil® is covered by Wisconsin Medicaid, the Standard Plan, the Benchmark Plan, and the Core Plan. Gardasil® is not a covered service for the FPW program.

Portal Fundamentals Training Sessions for Dentists

The Department of Health Services will be conducting ForwardHealth Portal fundamentals training for dentists beginning in July 2010. These training sessions will provide an overview of the public and secure areas of the Portal, as well as a specific focus on the newly available Portal claims functions for dentists. Registration for these sessions is required.

BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan Training Available for Providers

The Department of Health Services (DHS) is conducting provider training for

If you are *already* on the Waiting List, you don't need to do anything right now. In a few weeks, you will receive a fact sheet and instructions on how to enroll in Basic.

Monthly Premiums and Enrollment Dates for the Basic Plan:

- All members must pay a premium of \$130 per person, per month for coverage in the Basic Plan.
- Enrollment in the Basic Plan always starts on the 1st of the month. Which month coverage starts depends on when one pays the first premium.
 - If your first premium is received before 4:30 p.m. on the 15th of the month, your enrollment will start on the first of the next month.
 - If your first premium is received after 4:30 p.m. on the 15th of the month, enrollment will be delayed a month.

For example: If you sign up and pay your first premium between June 1 and June 15 by 4:30 p.m., your coverage will start July 1. If you sign up and pay your first premium between June 15 at 4:30 p.m. and June 30 by 4:30 p.m., your coverage will begin on August 1.

- Each month members will get a premium payment slip in the mail.
- A full premium payment will be due on the 5th of each month for coverage the next month. These premiums can be paid through the mail using the premium payment slip.
- If an individual fails to pay a monthly premium **in full** by the 5th of the month, coverage will end and the individual will not be able to reenroll in the Basic Plan for 12 months.
- Individuals on the Basic Plan will be invited to enroll in the Core Plan as openings are available based on funding, in the order in which they applied.

BadgerCare Plus Core Plan Renewals:

Renewing Your Core Plan for the First Time?

Not only is it time for BagderCare Plus Basic to begin, but families who registered for BadgerCare Plus Core Plan last year in June will be coming up for renewal!

- Current enrollees will get a letter in the mail that will indicate "it is time to renew" Core Plan benefits.
- Renewal applications must be submitted in the "renewal month" or the following month
- If not submitted in time, the individual will have to apply for the waiting list.
- Step 1: Start the Renewal Application within the first 5 days of the renewal month.
- Step 2: Submit the Renewal Application by the end of the renewal month or the following month
- Step 3: 30 days to pay the \$60 fee
- Step 4: 30 days to provide the required verifications
- NOTE: Even if all the steps are completed "in time," any steps

the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan in June 2010. The Basic Plan is a self-funded plan that focuses on providing BadgerCare Plus Core Plan waiting list members with access to vital, costeffective primary and preventive care.

Introducing the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

Individuals on the waitlist for the Core Plan can begin enrolling in the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan on June 1, 2010, with benefits starting on July 1, 2010. The Basic Plan is a self-funded plan that focuses on providing Core Plan waitlist members with access to vital, cost-effective primary and preventive care. This option will allow members to have some minimal form of coverage until space becomes available in the Core Plan and will help prevent bankruptcy due to excessive medical debt.

Coverage of Certain Medical Services Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

Following is an overview of the covered medical services under the Basic Plan. Refer to the <u>Online Handbook</u> on the ForwardHealth Portal for more information on covered services, policies, and procedures.

Ambulance Services Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

Ambulance services covered under the Basic Plan are limited to emergency transportation by land or air ambulance. Non-emergency transportation by ambulance is not covered under the Basic Plan.

Ambulatory Surgery Center Services Covered Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

The Basic Plan covers up to five ASC visits per member per enrollment year. A visit is defined as all ASC services delivered on the same date of service (DOS). Visits that exceed the Basic Plan service limitations are considered noncovered. Surgeries for services not covered under the Basic Plan (e.g., transplant surgeries) are not covered.

Dental Services Covered Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

A limited number of dental services are covered under the Basic Plan when performed as emergency services. Refer to the Attachment of this ForwardHealth completed after the month following the renewal month will create a gap in eligibility.

Help individuals complete all necessary steps to either get on the Core Plan Waiting list or Renew ASAP!

- When helping individuals renew Core Plan benefits, do your own eligibility review:
 - Does the enrollee now have Access to Insurance?
 - o Is the individual eligible for a different benefits program?
 - BadgerCare Plus: pregnancy, children
 - Elderly, Blind, Disabled Medicaid: disability determinations, worsening medical conditions
 - Medical Assistance Purchase Plan: disability determinations, worsening medical conditions, ability to work
 - Health Insurance Risk Sharing Plan (HIRSP): medications, therapies, mental health treatments needed that Core Plan didn't cover
- Due Process Under The BadgerCare Plus Core Plan:
 - Appeal Denials: You have a legal right to a written explanation of the denial of service, reduction of coverage, or termination of coverage.
 - How to Appeal: Attempt to resolve the matter through a phone call or letter to the Enrollment Service Center staff. If that doesn't correct the problem, Contact the Division of Hearings & Appeals and Request a Medicaid Fair Hearing
- There is NO Appeals Process Under BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan! Consumers unhappy with a decision should request a reconsideration (in writing) from the Department of Health Services.

Coalition Roundup!

Local HealthWatch Coalitions have been busy! Below is a brief look at some events, announcements, and news from around the State. Coalition contacts are listed in the sidebar if you have questions on a story or would like to follow up with the coalition directly.

First, HealthWatch Coalitions are reporting a strong response to Core Plan renewal calls; it looks like people are being found and are successfuly renewing their benefits for the next year and getting their physicals when necessary.

Dane County HealthWatch would like to thank Josh Weisbrod from HIRSP for coming in to talk about changes to HIRSP and the new Federal Risk Pool at the June 7 Dane County HealthWatch Meeting. Both the **Chippewa** and **Eau Claire County HealthWatch Coalitions** have been encountering problems dealing with getting people's FoodShare benefits renewed after they have been dropped at the six-month review. Fortunately, both have found help in their county Economic Support offices, who have been able to pull the cases from the state and correct the Update for Current Dental Terminology (CDT) codes that are covered under the Basic Plan when performed as emergency services. ForwardHealth defines emergency dental care as an immediate service that must be provided to relieve the member from pain, an acute infection, swelling, trismus, fever, or trauma. By indicating the designated CDT procedure codes on claims for Basic Plan dental services, emergency service is implied. Providers should retain documentation of emergency services in case of a future audit.

Disposable Medical Supplies Covered Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

The Basic Plan covers ostomy supplies, disposable medical supplies (DMS) that are required with the use of durable medical equipment, and preferred blood glucose test strips. Non-preferred diabetic supplies are not covered under the Basic Plan.

Durable Medical Equipment Covered Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

The Basic Plan will reimburse up to \$500.00 for DME per member per enrollment year. The cost of DME repairs counts toward this service limitation. The cost of blood glucose meters do not count toward this service limitation. Durable medical equipment that exceeds the \$500.00 service limitation is considered noncovered. Prior authorization is not required for DME under the Basic Plan. Prior authorization is not accepted for nonpreferred diabetic supplies.

End-Stage Renal Disease Services Covered Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

End-stage renal disease (ESRD) services covered under the Basic Plan are the same as those covered under the BadgerCare Plus Standard Plan, the BadgerCare Plus Benchmark Plan, and the Core Plan. End-stage renal disease services include dialysis and other kidney-related services for members with a diagnosis of ESRD who do not qualify for Medicare ESRD services. Note: End-stage renal disease service providers who submit claims as an ESRD facility are not subject to the Basic Plan's outpatient hospital limitations. Refer to the June 2010 ForwardHealth problems. Likewise in Southern Wisconsin, Second Harvest has been a strong ally for getting people access to FoodShare benefits. For more information on Second Harvest, please contact <u>Gina Wilson</u>.

Also in **Chippewa**, <u>Rose Marsh</u> has been volunteering at the Open Door Clinic and has been helping people enroll in BadgerCare Plus Basic. Nice work, Rose!

Milwaukee County HealthWatch had some good news, as well, with regard to the BadgerCare Plus HMO enrollment contract debacle going on in that region. Although Managed Health Services have now filed a protest, which has put the publishing of the new HMO information on hold, the state has not rolled everyone into fee-for-service plans (where the non-emergency medical transportation issues ensue) and has allowed them to continue going to their existing HMOs, at least for the time being. New cases however, as of April, are being pushed into fee-for-service plans indefinitely.

CASE TIP: Prescription Drug Coverage For Basic Enrollees

Individuals on the wait list for the Core Plan began enrolling in the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan on June 1, 2010. When benefits begin (for some as soon as July 1, 2010) enrollees can anticipate the following prescription drug coverage. First, it is important to note that the Basic Plan has a closed drug formulary; only the following drugs are covered:

- Certain generic drugs
- A limited number of over-the-counter drugs
- Humalog insulin, Humalog Mix insulin, and Lantus insulin
- Tamiflu
- Relenza

Providers and other interested individuals may refer to the BadgerCare Plus Basic National Drug Code List on the Pharmacy page of the <u>ForwardHealth</u> <u>Portal</u> or may consult the <u>ePocrates Web site</u> for a list of drugs covered by the Basic Plan.

Grapevine Issue: Plug Pulled on Office of Health Reform Advisory Council!



The Advisory Council to Wisconsin's new Office of Health Reform that we described in the Grapevine of the last HealthWatch <u>Wisconsin Update</u> has been **disbanded**, presumably due to an increased volume of vitriol coming from parties feeling neglected.

At this time, it appears likely that key stakeholders will still be available to provide input as the Office moves forward with the implementation of Health Reform.

Hospice Services Covered Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

Hospice services covered under the Basic Plan are the same as those covered under the Core Plan. The table in this memo lists the reimbursable hospice revenue codes with the appropriate corresponding Healthcare Common Procedure Coding System (HCPCS) procedure code under the Basic Plan.

Hospital Services Covered Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

The following hospital services are covered under the Basic Plan: Inpatient hospital services; Outpatient hospital services; Rehabilitation hospital stays; and Emergency room services.

Pharmacy Services Covered Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

The Basic Plan has a closed drug formulary. Providers may refer to the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan National Drug Code List on the Pharmacy page of the <u>ForwardHealth Portal</u> for a list of drugs covered by the Basic Plan.

Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, and Speech and Language Pathology Services Covered Under the BadgerCare Plus Basic Plan

The Basic Plan covers the same physical therapy (PT), occupational therapy (OT), and speech and language pathology (SLP) services as the Core Plan. Refer to the Online Handbook on the <u>ForwardHealth Portal</u> for covered services, policies, and procedures. The Basic Plan covers up to 10 visits in each therapy discipline (PT, OT, and SLP) per member, per enrollment year. Cardiac rehabilitation visits are counted towards the 10 visits allowed for PT. A therapy visit is defined as all therapy services delivered on the same date of service (DOS) by the same rendering provider.
