#### **Getting Started:**

- Start by identifying community partners and leaders, including representatives from hospital systems, Head Start, parents, Birth-to-3 Coordinators, public health nurses, economic support workers, school nurses and counselors, advocates, employers, and members of the faith community.
- 2. Watch for an RFP. Before the end of 2010, we will issue an RFP for Coalition Building and Development. There will likely be a fast turn-around on applications for funding. We hope to have new coalitions begin work in early 2011!
- We will encourage anyone who is interested in competing for this grant award to call HealthWatch Wisconsin in advance of submitting an application to discuss ideas and strategies.
- 4. Review: We will prioritize coalition development for low-enrollment, underperforming or health disparity locations across Wisconsin. In fact, HealthWatch Wisconsin will prioritize coalition development where local health departments take a leading role.
- After funding, HealthWatch Wisconsin will continue to help with ongoing technical consultation and leadership training. We will be looking for areas that can DEVELOP and SUSTAIN a coalition, after the start-up assistance is complete.

# Digging into Health Reform: The Medical Loss Ratio Explained

#### What is the Medical Loss Ratio?

In order to ensure value to a health plan's participants, the Affordable Care Act has implemented a financial guideline on insurance companies to encourage quality care and improvement. Otherwise known as a medical loss ratio (MLR), if 80 cents of one premium dollar is put toward medical claims and activities that improve a patient's health, 20 cents is then left for overhead administrative costs, salaries, etc., deeming the company's medical loss ratio of 80%. Insurers in the large group market are required by the new health reform law to have an 85% MLR and those in the individual or small group market are required to have an 80% MLR. Insurers not meeting these guidelines (for example, only meeting a 60% MLR) will have to provide rebates to policyholders. However, as in the case of McDonald's and CVS companies who offer a "mini-med" limited, low-cost benefit to their associates, plans of that nature (which currently do not appear to comply with the regulations set for 2011), may no longer be an option unless a potential waiver can get government approval.

**Complications:** Implementation of this provision proves difficult, however, as the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC) and federal officials struggle to establish a consistent definition and clear method of calculation concerning rebates for health insurance premiums. If clarifications are too broad, insurers may attempt to frame certain administrative costs as promoting policy holder health. In contrast to this, a definition that is too narrow could erroneously cut provisions that truly benefit individual consumers. The NAIC's Health Insurance and Managed Care Committee scheduled an evaluation of draft regulations on Oct. 14, allowing a final draft to be approved by the full body at the NAIC's fall national meeting Oct. 18-21. Experts expect that final MLR regulations will dictate whether or not more money will genuinely go towards patient care.

## Update: HHS Awards \$727 Million To Community Health Centers As Part Of New Law

## Update to a Story Previously Reported on in the Update Newsletter:

In the September 15 edition of the Update Newsletter, we brought you an article called "Health Reform: A Closer Look at Support for Community Health Centers." At that time, we reported that the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act of 2009 called for an investment of \$2 billion in health care center expansion, which included funding for more sites and better health information technology. The Affordable Care Act adjusted the policy in 2010 to include additional funding for health care centers nationwide.

Just last week, the Obama administration announced it is awarding \$727 million to community health centers around the nation to help them build new clinics and improve the safety net, according to *The Washington Post*. The US Department of Health and Human Services estimates that the \$727 million to 143 clinics will bring more health care to 745,000 underserved patients. Wisconsin will see well over \$15 million through the awards. Some funding distributions are as follows:

### Accountable Care Organizations: What to Expect

The Affordable Care Act suggests that in a fee for service payment systems of Medicare and privatized insurance, there is a need to increase the overall quality of care and reduce the amount of fraudulent spending. The proposed solution is engaging in local accountability to impart change nationwide. The "means to the end" is the formation of "Accountable Care Organizations," (ACOs) designed to be teams of local health care providers who provide a full range of coordinated healthcare services to patients. They can be configured in a variety of ways, but all must consist of primary and tertiary care facilities, collaborating with specialty physicians and hospitals, and forming networks that are all willing to be accountable for patient care while working under a "particular payment and performance measurement framework."

Under this system, individual ACO spending benchmarks will be determined by past trends in patient population. Doctors and hospitals will be paid for the improvement of care, not for increasing the amount of care provided. Set to be phased in over the next 5 years, Congress will introduce a new Medicare project just to see if ACOs work; if they fail to meet cost savings and quality of care objectives at regional standards, Medicare will provide lower payments. On the other hand, if objectives are satisfied, ACOs will be awarded shared savings payments which can be divided up among providers and invested towards IT improvements, nursing homes, etc. If conditions prove successful over the next two years, the formations of more ACOs could be coming in our near future.

This includes a redesigned "verification checklist," with changes to verifying Wisconsin state residency an individual's social security number, allowing workers to put the application into pending status and request proof for either field of information.

Ops Memo 10-75 Citizenship and Identity Auto Update in CARES *(released October 14)* 

New Policy: Effective November 1, the state will submit a file to the SSA with an individual's name, social security number and date of birth to verify citizenship, as opposed to the current process, which requires the applicant to submit the verification to the local agency or to verify using available resources such as birth query or a DMV match. The new verification requirements apply to Medicaid and BadgerCare Plus applicants. Verified citizenship returned from the SSA will also meet the requirements for the FoodShare, Caretaker Supplement, Child Care and W-2 programs.

Ops Memo 10-74 New Birth Query Functionality in CARES Worker Web (released October 14)

**New Policy:** The Birth Query function will now be available using the Navigation Menu in the CARES Worker Web (CWW). This allows workers to enter the name and birth date of an individual, provided that an identifying number is entered to ensure the query is only requested if an individual has applied for a program of assistance.

Ops Memo 10-73 Job Access Loan (JAL) Funding *(released October 6)* 

**New Policy:** The policy provides guidance regarding when to use Supportive Service funding vs. a JAL (JALs should not be used in place of W-2 services), describes a new Webl report that tracks JAL expenditures (showing each agency's spending target, percent spent, and remaining funds available), and encourages W-2 agency staff to maximize collaboration with other service providers to meet local needs

## CASE TIP:

## Grapevine: What are "Essential Benefits?"

Under the Affordable Care Act, insurance companies will no longer be allowed to set "annual and lifetime limits," or limits on the dollar amount of "essential" health benefits that they will cover in a year or over the course of a person's lifetime. The elimination of annual limits will happen gradually, until they are completely prohibited in 2014 (for example, the annual limit on essential benefits coverage will rise to \$1.25 million in 2011 and \$2 million in 2012). However, the rule does not clearly define what "essential benefits" includes. People anticipate that the package of benefits will include doctor visits, emergency and maternity care, hospitalization, prescription drugs, etc. Remember, benefits eventually defined as "non-essential" benefits will still be applicable to annual and lifetime limits. It is unclear if existing Wisconsin mandates will be included as essential benefits. Weigh in! If you would like to let Wisconsin's Commissioner of Insurance know what benefits they should direct the Department of Health and Human Services to include in the "essential benefits" definition, send us an email! Reimbursement Rate Increase for Pharmacy Providers for Therapeutic Interchange and Influenza Vaccine Ops Memo 10-72 Trial Jobs Return to Former Policies and Procedures (released October 6)

**New Policy:** Effective immediately, W-2 agencies must return to using all W-2 Trial Job policies found in the W-2 Manual, Section 7.3.0. Several forms and agreements have been updated to reflect the policies and subsidy calculations described in the W-2 Manual.

#### Prior Authorization Is Required for Avandia, Avandamet, and Avandaryl

Effective for dates of service on and after September 27, 2010, as a result of Food and Drug Administration safety concerns, Avandia, Avandamet, and Avandaryl are now non-preferred drugs that require clinical prior authorization for BadgerCare Plus Standard Plan, Medicaid, and SeniorCare members.

#### Hospice Reimbursement Rate Changes

Wisconsin Medicaid and BadgerCare Plus hospice reimbursement rates are based on hourly and per diem rates established by the federal government for all covered hospice services. Effective for dates of service (DOS) on and after October 1, 2010, Wisconsin Medicaid and BadgerCare Plus hospice service reimbursement rates will change.

The Attachment of this *ForwardHealth Update* includes the new hospice rates that are effective for DOS on and after October 1, 2010. Nursing home room and board rates are not impacted by these hospice reimbursement rate changes.

#### 2010 Rate Changes for Services Receiving Only Federal Funds

Effective for claims processed and paid on and after October 1, 2010, the federal share will decrease from 60.21% to 60.16% for the following services:

- Community Support Program (CSP) services
- Comprehensive Community Services
- Crisis Intervention services
- Outpatient Mental Health and Substance Abuse
- Services in the Home or Community for Adults.

Wisconsin Medicaid will pay up to the federal share of the contracted rates for these services. If the provider's usual and customary charge for the service is less than the contracted rate, Wisconsin Medicaid will pay the federal share of the usual and customary charge.

## Reimbursement Reduction for Most Paper Claims Submitted to ForwardHealth

As a result of the Medicaid Rate Reform project, ForwardHealth will reduce reimbursement on most claims submitted to ForwardHealth on paper. Effective for claims received after December 10, 2010, most paper claims will be subject up to a \$1.10 reimbursement reduction per claim. Providers are encouraged to submit claims electronically to avoid this reimbursement reduction.
